Dear Property Owner:

Elizabethtown Gas is a natural gas utility with pipeline infrastructure near your property. The company's on-going safety program includes inspections, monitoring and maintenance. Natural gas pipelines are safe and reliable and incidents are uncommon. Potential risks to pipeline integrity are identified and addressed on the company Integrity Management Program. Please join our commitment to safety by reviewing the items below:

- The general location of our pipelines are marked by yellow posts, like the one pictured to the right, to help ensure the line is not inadvertently damaged. The markers list a phone number to contact Elizabethtown Gas in the event of an emergency or safety concern. These markers must remain in place. Federal regulations provide for severe penalties for damaging, removing or destroying these markers.
- Structures such as decks, pools, patios, sheds, play sets, fences etc. may not be placed on the pipeline right-of-way, which is indicated by cleared corridors with pipeline markers. The grading on the pipeline must not be changed.
- If you notice any unauthorized construction, excavation, dumping, or unusual activity near our pipeline please call us. New Jersey law requires excavators to call the New Jersey One Call System by dialing 811 at least three business days prior to the start of excavation work so all underground lines can be clearly marked. If damage to any gas pipeline occurs call 911 than call us at 800 492 4009.
- Leaks from gas pipelines are uncommon but potentially hazardous. If you notice any of the following signs in the vicinity of the pipeline assume there may be a hazard and follow the instructions in item 5 below.
 - Look - for blowing dirt or continued bubbling of standing water.
 - Listen – for a hissing or roaring sound may indicate natural gas is leaking.
 - Smell – Most importantly, stay alert for the distinctive rotten-egg-like smell of natural gas. You should take action anytime you detect even a small amount of this odor.
- If any of the three indications above occur:
 - EVACUATE EVERYONE IN THE AREA IMMEDIATELY. Don't try to identify or stop the leak.
 - Do not touch anything that may cause a spark – This includes lighters, matches, cigarettes, flashlights, light switches and telephones in the suspected leak area. Wait until you are away from the area to use a cell phone.
 - Call – Once you are out of the leak area in a safe place, call Elizabethtown Gas at 800-492-4009, and call 9-1-1.
- Elizabethtown Gas maintains an emergency response program for receiving, rapidly responding, and taking immediate action to protect life and property with a trained and well equipped work force.
